Estate Reunited for First Time in 70 Years



April 6th 2017 marks an historic day for the Chiswick House & Gardens Trust as it assumes operational management for both Chiswick gardens and the main house, which has been under the care of English Heritage up until now. The move brings together the estate under one team for the first time in almost 70 years.

CHGT was established by English Heritage and the London Borough of Hounslow, and has managed the 65 acre gardens since 2010. Uniting the house and gardens enables CHGT to tell the story of the house and gardens in full, inspiring visitors with the incredible history of the estate.

CHGT Chairman, Andrew Fane said: "This landmark agreement unites the villa and its gardens for the first time in almost 70 years. Our plan is to enable even more people from our local communities, the UK and internationally, to explore and enjoy the estate. Our team is working to improve visitor facilities so that we can show the historical, horticultural and architectural significance of the villa and gardens together as a complete work of art. Uniting the management of the villa and gardens is true to the original vision of Richard Boyle, 3rd Earl of

Burlington and 4th Earl of Cork, who created this wonderful estate from 1727-32."

Ongoing support

Both the London Borough of Hounslow and English Heritage will continue to support CHGT. English Heritage will remain responsible for the conservation of the Grade I listed house and for the care of the collections on display within it.

Kate Mavor, Chief Executive of English Heritage, said: "English Heritage will continue to support the Trust, in particular in the house with our curatorial expertise. But placing the house and gardens under the care of one single team makes complete sense as it will allow for the site's overall story to be better told and make for a better visit."

Councillor Corinna Smart, from the London Borough of Hounslow commented: "We are delighted at this agreement and look forward to working with CHGT to deliver its exciting vision for Chiswick."

CHGT Director, Clare O'Brien, formerly of the Wallace Collection and the National Theatre said: "This agreement is the first step in fulfilling the

vision that our Trustees, English Heritage and the London Borough of Hounslow had in creating CHGT. Now, we are working on plans to enable more people to enjoy the site and understand its story. Come and enjoy the House this Easter!"

"This summer, we will be applying for funding to restore the house and improve our visitor facilities. We want to work even more closely with schools, universities and the one-million members of the public who visit us each year" Clare added.

Magical Lantern Festival



For the second year, we have welcomed the show of Chinese lantern figures. This year the theme was 'Explore the Silk Road' and celebrated the Chinese New Year of the Rooster.



The lanterns represented scenes from Europe, Central Asia, Arabia, Persia and Ancient China. The Silk Road theme, dating back to the Western Han Dynasty of China in 200 BC, has a current cultural significance as it represents the spread of trade and culture between East and West.

Lantern festivals also date back to this time and as they grow in popularity in the West, there are plans in China for a new Silk Road along the old trade route.

Waterfowl Update (by Richard Sales)

Our lone female swan flew away many times since September, but came back with a new male in February.

They have a habit of flying away from time to time, but they always come back. There is no sign of nest building yet, which is a little late if they are going to breed this year.

The resident Egyptian Goose pair had a brood of seven in October and a further five in late February, of which three are still here after three weeks. We expect another two broods this year. A new pair are trying to be residents as well; expect squabbles over territory!

The Swan Sanctuary in Teddington used a canoe and a net gun to capture and free some plastic netting from the head of a Canada goose. It took them four days to achieve success.

Our winter resident Shovellers and Little Grebe have flown away to breed.

Herons visit daily from Brentford, whereas cormorants seem to come only when the lake has filled.
