Camellia Show



CHGT Events 2018 - The Women who made Chiswick



This year, to celebrate 100 years since women gained the right to vote, the Trust is hosting a series of events on the theme of "The Women who made Chiswick". This explores the lesser known stories of women who left their mark on Chiswick House and Gardens – aristocratic ladies with money and great social influence, 18th century business women taking on the building trade, and housekeepers ensuring the smooth running of the household.

17 April: The Ladies of Chiswick - Join the House curator Dr Esmé Whittaker for this talk exploring the lives of Lady Burlington and Georgiana, Duchess of Devonshire, and discover how they influenced and used the House and Gardens.

Curator's Spotlight

Caring for Chiswick's Collections in the Late Eighteenth and Nineteenth Century

Winter is always a busy time for the Collections team in the House and this year we completed a project to upgrade the painting alarm system and also removed three paintings for treatment at the conservation studio. As the Conservators and I carry out this work, it makes me think about how the collections at Chiswick House were cared for in the past. While researching the changes made to Chiswick by the 5th and 6th Dukes of Devonshire in the late 18th and 19th century, I noted down with interest the methods that were used to protect, display and catalogue the collections.

Great efforts were made to protect the collections from being damaged by dust and light. When the extensive building works to add wings to the villa were taking place in the early 1790s, the most valuable paintings were 'taken down, and put up in packing-cases' until the improvements were finished. Loose cotton case covers were used to protect expensive upholstered furniture and, by 1869, there were also loose linen covers for the painted white silk wall hangings in the Drawing Room. The 5th Duke of Devonshire ordered 'silk for picture curtains' which were hung from brass rods in the West and East Saloon. The experience of discovering a painting 'screened by a veil' only added to the enjoyment of one visitor to Chiswick in 1838. The windows were fitted with blinds including, by 1811, '2 Blinds to the Windows in the Dome', and, by 1869, blinds to the skylights.

Despite such efforts, when the director of the Royal Gallery in Berlin, G.F. Waagen, visited Chiswick in 1838, he was critical of both the condition and the position of the paintings. He recorded, among the great number of paintings, 'many good ones, many excellent; but unfortunately they are partly in a bad condition, either from cleaning or from dryness. Several pictures too hang in so unfavourable a light, that no decided opinion can be formed of them'.

We can only imagine the reaction of the 6th Duke when his house guest (who was there for a 'breakfast') turned critic. To Waagen's great joy, the Duke politely promised to have one of the paintings repaired.

Both the 5th and 6th Dukes of Devonshire knew exactly who to turn to for advice about the paintings. The 5th Duke employed the painter, dealer and picture restorer Benjamin Vandergucht, to clean and repair the pictures at Chiswick. Unfortunately, while returning from one such visit to Chiswick House, his boat was run down and he drowned in the Thames. The 6th Duke used the influential art advisors William and John Seguier. William was made the first keeper of the National Gallery when it was founded in 1824. The household accounts for Chiswick record payments made in the early 1840s to 'Seguier & Co' and 'John Seguier' for cleaning and repairing pictures. They may also have advised the Duke on the arrangement of the collections as they did at Chatsworth. employment at Chiswick certainly coincides with the purchasing of picture line and picture rods, as well as picture frames from the leading frame-maker, William Cribb, indicating that an extensive re-hang was underway.

Such changes to the arrangement of the collections meant that it was difficult to keep the catalogue up to date. As J. Norris Brewer noted in 1816, 'A written catalogue is preserved at Chiswick house; but the situation of many of the pictures is altered since these accounts were drawn up'. A problem which today I can easily rectify with just a few simple clicks on our collections management database.

Dr Esmé Whittaker will be giving a short talk at this year's Friends AGM on 'The Ambassador of Morocco' portrait by Godfrey Kneller that hangs in the Domed Saloon. The AGM will be held on 4th June at 7pm.

Chiswick House and Gardens Workshop

We discussed different models for better engaging with House visitors including events, tours, education and other types of experiences. The Trust is

Tales from the Riverbank - Spring Update - Richard Sales

Our swan pair have been here all winter and are now nest-building on the picnic area side of the lake. However, the male (cob) is still under three years old and may be too young to be fertile.

The resident pair of Egyptian Geese had a breed of seven goslings on St Valentine's Day. Three were taken within hours, probably by heron, magpie and/or crow. Within a week the remaining four were gone: easy pickings as they were the only young available. Had they survived, they would probably not have coped with the "Beast from the East" two weeks later. The total loss of their young means they will probably have another brood by mid-April.

The eagle-eyed amongst you may have seen that our winter resident Little Grebe/Dabchick has now gone, but our pair of Shovellers are still in residence.

A few of our small 'black headed gulls' have their summer black heads already. They will depart for the Coast to breed in late Spring.

The coots are already nest building on the lake.
